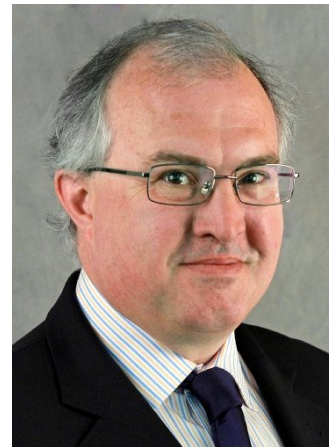

For a number of years he lived and worked in Hong Kong.

He was elected a principal vice president of Bechtel in 2006 and a senior vice president in 2014.
